TRORC Seeks Intermunicipal Regional Energy Coordinator



The Two Rivers-Ottauquechee Regional Commission (TRORC) is looking to hire an Intermunicipal Regional Energy Coordinator (IREC) to help reduce energy use and make the

switch to renewable energy for several towns in the region. The IREC will work with TRORC and representatives from Thetford, Fairlee, Norwich, Strafford, Sharon, Barnard, and Woodstock on energy efficiency and conservation projects focused on municipal and public buildings, vehicles, and services. The position will produce benefits for the towns in terms of cost savings, energy reductions, and carbon reductions. A Case for Divesting from a Dying Fossil Fuel Industry



Check out this recent opinion piece, making a case for why the federal government needs to invest in clean energy. Sarah Raskins, a former member of the board of governors of the Federal Reserve and deputy Treasury secretary, editorialized in the *New York Times* about the need for the federal government to stop propping up fossil fuels and, instead, transition post-pandemic to a more clean, resilient energy economy. Sarah makes the case that fossil fuels are a bad investment and that we need to reduce greenhouse gases as the climate crisis will have a large, economical impact on the

country. She also highlights that the clean energy sector continues to be one of the fastest growing sectors and has generated roughly three times as many jobs compared to the fossil fuel industry over the last few years. Read the full op-ed in the *New York Times* here.

Protect Access to the Sun -- and Solar



Solar United Neighbors and Vote Solar have recently raised the alarm about a petition that has been fast-tracked for review by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC). The petition would look to regulate the cost at which home solar owners could sell their credits back to their utilities. This means that it would reduce the return for home-owners with solar, increase the payback time for new solar buyers, and decrease the number of people buying solar, which in turn

Restarting the Engine: HEAT Squad Home Energy Audits



Do you have a home in Addison, Rutland, Bennington, Caledonia, Essex, Orleans, or Windsor County and have you been thinking about getting a home energy audit? HEAT Squad is ready to help as they are restarting their home energy audits program. HEAT Squad has developed a Covid

precautions protocol to reduce risks and ensure the safety of both homeowner and auditor.

After the initial welcome with the homeowner wearing a face mask, ideally the homeowner and auditor will not be in the house at the same time. During the visit, social distancing practices will be used as well as the auditor wearing a face mask, gloves, and disinfecting surfaces. After the homeowner receives their written report, they will have the opportunity to review the recommendations, potential solutions, financing and rebate options, and next steps over the phone or virtually with the auditor.

Efficiency Vermont rebates in place through December 31, 2020 cover 50% of the weatherization project cost, up to \$2000 or \$4000, depending on your income. Homeowners can apply for a low-interest home energy loan with HEAT Squad. As long as your loan closes by October 31 and you income qualify, Efficiency Vermont will make the first 6 monthly loan payments for you up to \$900, not to exceed 50% of the loan amount. Now is a great time to act, rebates and financing options have never been better and they will expire - so act now! VEEP Hosting Free, Professional Learning Workshops for Teachers



The Vermont Energy Education Program (VEEP) is hosting virtual, interactive-style workshops on the NGSS Instructional Toolkit for Vermont teachers. The workshops will focus on anchoring phenomena and instructional routines that support

student sense-making, and will share curriculum ideas that work in the classroom, as well as home-learning lessons and strategies with a lens of project based learning. Attendees will work in small and large group discussions, make and share models of their understanding, and try investigations at home. Teachers will get support from one another and the instructor with planning time for curriculum development. The workshops consist of 3, 2-hour sessions in both June and August.
