First Steps: Standing Up the New Vermont Climate Council



Last week, the State announced its first steps to begin the implementation process for the new climate-accountability law — the Global Warming Solutions Act. That started with finalizing the Legislature's appointments to the Vermont Climate Council, the newly formed body under the Solutions Act. Fifteen legislative appointments were made, rep-

resenting low income, small business, youth, the farming community and many other perspectives and expertise needed to do this work well. VNRC's Energy and Climate Program Director/VECAN Coordinator Johanna Miller and Board member Chad Farrell are among the appointees to the council, which will have its first meeting on November 20 and, from there, develop a plan to meet emissions reductions required by the new law. 19 Arrearage Assistance Program (VCAPP) run by the Vermont Department of Public Service. It was created by the Vermont Legislature and funded with \$8 million from the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act and the State of Vermont Coronavirus Relief Fund.

If you are an individual or business facing pandemic-induced hardship in these challenging times and could benefit from this program, find out far more about eligibility requirements and apply today here. The application deadline is November 30, 2020. People who do not have access to the online application can contact their local Community Action Agency, for assistance with the application process. Despite climate pollution reduction targets, as well as a long-held statutory goal to retrofit 80,000 homes, Vermont is failing to weatherize leaky buildings at the scale of what's required. A dramatic ramp in the number of homes weatherized is needed and, in so doing, can help thousands of

Vermonters save energy, save money, improve home comfort, enhance public health and take a significant bite out of our carbon footprint.

Why is the state falling so short? What's needed to dramatically increase the number of weatherization projects undertaken — especially those serving low-to moderate-income Vermonters? What's happening to shift this reality? And what you can you do to help Vermont make more progress? "The Transportation & Climate Initiative: Opportunities and Updates" hosted by VBSR on 10/28

In this webinar, hear how Vermont's transportation sector makes up the lion's share of our greenhouse gas emissions and how our lingering reliance on fossil fuels channels billions of dollars out of the state's economy each year. Hear a detailed overview from Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation Commissioner Peter Walke on TCI, including key equity considerations and next steps in the policymaking process. And listen to a review from Jordan Stutt with the Acadia Institute on how TCI can drive transportation investments that create

"Health Benefits of the Transportation and Climate Initiative" hosted by Sustainable Transportation Vermont on 10/30

In this webinar, get an overview of the preliminary health benefits of the TCI from Jonathon Buonocore, a research scientist at the Center for Climate Health and the Global Environment and member of the Transportation, Equity, Climate and Health (TRECH) Project team. Hear from Jared Ulmer, the Climate & Health Program Manager at the Vermont Department of Health about the findings of a recent project that looked at what health benefits Vermont could derive from meeting its transportation goals set out in the state's Comprehensive Energy Plan. Finally, learn from Dan Quinlan, an independent consultant and founder of the Vermont Climate and Health Alliance (VTCHA) and SolaVida, about how public health benefits are being considered through health impact modeling including where the modeling is strong and why the current methodology is inherently underestimating the health benefits. VTDigger: "Why aren't New Americans taking advantage of home weatherization programs?"

Virginie Diambou, the director of racial equity at the Champlain Valley Office of Economic Opportunity, explains why New Americans aren't taking advantage of home weatherization programs. Energy costs are a big burden for many New Americans and a poorly insulated




home means even higher costs. "While weatherization programs already exist to help people weatherize their homes, there are challenges in ensuring those programs are accessible to New Americans."

One challenge is that home weatherization may not be a top priority for new arrivals and in many cases, they may not understand what it is or why it's important during

long Vermont winters. Language can also be a barrier to weatherizing homes as 14% of Burlington city residents speak a language other than English at home. Despite this, information about weatherization programs is most often only available in English. Diambou is helping to make these programs more accessible by raising awareness about weatherization among members of the New American community in her role.
