Electrify Everything: Cut (Emissions From) Your Lawn - May 19 at 7 PM



Running a fossil-fuel-powered lawnmower for an hour emits the same amount as driving a car for 300 miles (or driving 6 to 8 cars for an hour). Multiply that by 20 times each year, and it adds up. But that's not the only way to cut your lawn!

The Norwich Energy Committee is hosting an online presentation Wednesday, May 19, at 7 pm to help you

learn how to cut your grass AND cut your emissions. Hear from Steve Wisbaum of the

Vermont-based *Mow Electric!* Campaign and Lynnwood Andrews of the Norwich Conservation Commission. They'll cover the basics of purchasing electric lawn equipment or finding lawn services that use electric equipment and ways to reduce your mowing area and frequency and still maintain your landscape.

Battery technology has now dramatically increased run time such that this equipment is ready for prime time for commercial mowing contractors and businesses with large mowing needs.

In March of this year, SunCommon hosted its second annual Climate Action Film Festival (CAFF), which brings together activists, filmmakers, and communities to witness and celebrate stories of climate action. The virtual festival featured both short and feature length films, as well as panel discussions and breakout conversations with filmmakers, climate

activists, and organizations committed to facing the climate crisis head-on.

In celebration of Earth Day, SunCommon brought back some of their favorite films from this year's CAFF as part of their Encore Event series. 


Local Motion's Traveling E-bike Lending Library will be in several locations this spring and summer, thanks to towns, libraries, and energy committees across Vermont who serve as their hosts. If you live in the Upper Valley, you can also check out the Upper Valley Lending Library, which travels around towns in the region.

There are also several permanent lending libraries around the state, including the Burlington Lending Library located at their Trailside Center, the Brattleboro Satellite Lending Library hosted by the Brooks Memorial Library, and the Rutland Satellite Lending Library hosted by the Rutland Recreation Department.

New Report Examines Vermont's Response to Climate Change



Last summer, SolaVida, a Vermont-based non-profit, collaborated with the University of New Hampshire Sustainability Institute to compile an inventory of Vermont's publicly funded programs that address clean energy and climate change. The resulting report, "The Cost of Climate Change In Vermont: Part One – Spending Inventory" establishes the foundation for a

full analysis that would organize and document the spending that underpins the state's projects and programs.

Dan Quinlan, founder of the SolaVida that conducted the work, says that "Creating a view of activity underway is essential to any state government that is trying to develop a cohesive and comprehensive plan for moving to a clean energy economy and for addressing climate change."

Findings from the report indicate areas where there is a clear need for increased attention from policymakers, including public health, water management, and the vulnerability of industries that will be drastically impacted by climate change.

USDA Grant Opportunity to Offset High Energy Costs in Rural Areas



The Rural Utilities Service (RUS), an agency of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), announced the availability of up to \$10 million in competitive grants to assist communities with extremely high energy costs.

The grant funds may be used to acquire, construct, or improve energy generation, transmission, or

distribution facilities serving communities where the average annual residential expenditure for home energy exceeds 275% of the national average. Eligible projects also include on-grid and off-grid renewable energy projects and the implementation of energy efficiency and energy conservation projects for eligible communities.

The application deadline is July 6, 2021.
