This week we are celebrating the historic investment the Vermont Legislature just made in climate action!

In the recently passed state budget, the Legislature committed \$250 million in funding for critical climate programs over the next few years. This investment is targeted toward essential, equitable pollution reduction and money-saving initiatives for Vermonters, including low- and moderate-income weatherization programs, low-income renewable energy projects, and implementation of the ensuing Climate Action Plan. Opportunity to Participate in VECAN Communications Collaborative!



We've got an exciting opportunity to share! We are looking for volunteers from Vermont energy committees to test and improve a toolkit to help take your education and outreach efforts to the next level!

VECAN/VNRC, VCRD (Vermont Council on Rural Development), and Vital Communities have put together a first draft of a toolkit to help support and guide community engagement and communications efforts of energy committees and coordinators. The toolkit includes templates to inventory your local communications resources and develop a plan, and short guides for effective use of various communications tools.

We want your help to review and test out these tools to ensure that they are as helpful as possible to community energy leaders! Our plan is to assemble a group of 6-10 people working on climate and energy issues on your own or as part of a committee, from all corners of the state and with all levels of experience.

The **time commitment** would include about four one-hour online work sessions this summer, plus some time between meetings to play with the resources and help with next steps we identify as a group. Energy Action Network (EAN) Releases 2020/2021 Annual Progress Report for Vermont



EAN's 2020/2021 Annual Progress Report for Vermont on Emissions, Energy, Equity, and the Economy is now live on their website!

Each year, the EAN team crunch the numbers to provide the most up-to-date analysis of where Vermont stands relative to its climate commitments and energy goals. New in this report is a summary of the EAN

Emission Reduction Pathways Model, which lays out the scale and pace of change likely needed to meet our 2025 and 2030 pollution reduction requirements.

Their analysis found that moving away from fossil-fueled transportation and heating, which currently contributes over 70% of Vermont's GHG emissions, will provide a major opportunity to strengthen the Vermont economy, create good-paying jobs, and save Vermonters money, and improve equity.

2021 VEEP Summer Institute: Local Connections to Energy and Climate!



The Vermont Energy Education Program (VEEP) invites all Vermont and New Hampshire educators to the 2021 VEEP Summer Institute: Local Connections to Energy and Climate!

This year's program explores local connections to energy & climate. The virtual program will take place August 9, 10, and 12 with each day's online session lasting no more than 3 hours.

Participants may expect some asynchronous work prior

to and between virtual sessions. After the conclusion of the synchronous program, participants may then collaborate with VEEP educators to bring to fruition custom curricula.

Through the program participants earn PD hours and may also enroll for 1 graduate credit. The registration deadline is July 26. Scholarship funds are available if cost is a barrier.

New Data Shows Vermont is Halfway to Paris but More Work is Needed



New data released by the state reveals that Vermont's greenhouse gas emissions declined by an estimated 5.6% from 2016 to 2019, reversing several years of rising emissions.

But experts say there's still a long road ahead. To meet its 2025 target, the state will need to cut emissions by

another 14% from 2019 levels. Jared Duval, executive director of the Energy Action Network, says, "That does not mean that business as usual will get us there."

A significant focus will need to be put on reducing emissions from the transportation and heating sectors, which combined account for over 70% of the state's greenhouse gas emissions. Unlike our electricity sector, which has been regulated under Vermont's Renewable Energy Standard since 2017, the transportation and heating sectors lack such robust policy.
