- 2022 Downtown Transportation Fund Grant Applications Due March 7 - The Department of Housing and Community Development announced the availability of approximately \$2,900,000 in Downtown Transportation Fund Grants (DTF) to support revitalization efforts in Designated Downtowns and eligible Designated Village Centers. - Vermont Multi-Unit Dwelling Electric Vehicle Charging Grant Program - This EV Charging Grant Program will provide up to \$1 million in grants to install electric vehicle charging solutions that provide accessible, affordable, and reliable home charging at multi-unit housing locations. - U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Launches Pilot Program to Deploy Renewable Energy Infrastructure to People in Rural Towns - The USDA announced up to \$10 million in grants to help people living in rural towns develop community renewable energy projects. - Green Mountain Power (GMP) Works to Create Resiliency Zones in Towns Across Vermont - GMP, Vermont's largest utility, plans to create new microgrids and community resilience zones as part of a plan to "radically transform" the grid that is outlined in the utility's new integrated resource plan (IRP). - Vermont Electric Coop (VEC) Powers Up Two New Solar Arrays in Jericho in Support of 100% Renewables by 2030 - Encore Renewable Energy and VEC announced the commissioning of two new community-scale solar projects, on the town's former gravel pit and former municipal landfill, comprising 4.5 megawatts (MW) of new, clean energy generation in Jericho. And on the heels of the adoption of the first statutorily-required Climate Action Plan last December, which requires significant, stepped pollution-reduction progress, this bill is likely the biggest opportunity in the short-term to reduce emissions in our most carbon-intensive sector." Vermont Multi-Unit Dwelling Electric Vehicle Charging Grant Program - Applications Due April 1



The 2022 Vermont Multi-Unit Dwelling Electric Vehicle Charging Grant Program will provide up to \$1 million in grants to install electric vehicle charging solutions that provide accessible, affordable, and reliable home charging at multi-unit housing locations. Funding may be used for the planning, permitting,

purchase, installation and other one time costs associated with the installation of EV charging equipment for plug-in electric vehicles, including all electric and plug-in hybrid models, according to the specific criteria.

Grants will be awarded up to \$80,000 per site, \$300,000 per applicant, with priority for grant awards given to affordable housing. Please find the full program description here, and the program application here. **Applications will be due April 1, 2022.**
