





Structure, Age & Funding


What is the organizational structure of your energy group?




Does your energy group receive any money from your town/city or other sources? If so, how much?

Recent Successes


Other recent notable successes:




Other priorities noted:






Other challenges noted:


- Outreach to town residents about community energy work

Understanding Your Municipality's Energy Portfolio




Utilizing ARPA & Municipal Challenges

Final Thoughts

- There is a clear need for more capacity in energy committees, at RPCs, and in Vermont's energy workforce
- Lack of funding is a major challenge but the moment to capitalize on federal dollars is now!
- At the municipal level, there is a need for more focus on and investments in the transportation and thermal spaces
- There could be more focus on municipal level policy and/or outreach strategies, including town ballot items, Selectboard liaisons, and relationship building
- Energy Planners at RPCs and staff at EVT are here to be resources to energy committees who need support doing this critical work
- Relationship building with your utilities can be very helpful and RPCs can help facilitate this connection
