### Association of Vermont Conservation Commissions (AVCC) 2022 Summit: Planning for a Climate-Changed Future – Saturday, October 15th, 2022 – Now

more than ever, Vermont communities are planning for our climate future, by putting infrastructure for resilience in place and also in devising new systems that adapt to our rapidly changing reality. Much of the recent action on climate has been at the state policy level, but Vermont's Climate Action Plan identifies strategies and actions that municipalities can engage in to prepare and respond to a changing climate. **Climate Progress in Vermont – Working Toward Cleaner Transportation, Heat, and Electricity – Wednesday, October 26th at 12pm** – Climate change is both a crisis and an opportunity. Vermont's Global Warming Solutions Act requires the state to help Vermonters cut energy costs and carbon in an equitable way. Unfortunately, Vermont is falling far short of meeting this obligation. Thankfully, though, tremendous work is underway. Don't miss this webinar, which will be jam-packed with updates from experts and legislative leaders, overviewing the current state-of-the-state on climate, potential opportunities for action in our biggest energy sectors, and why and how to add your voice to this important conversation. ## Vermont Council on Rural Development (VCRD) Seeking Climate Economy Resilient

**Communities** – VCRD's Climate Economy Resilient Communities Program will support three to five communities per year that are working on local climate action solutions. Through this program,

VCRD will provide assistance to communities to make strong forward movements toward a community engagement process, communication outreach planning, strategic planning, technical assistance, and/or project implementation. <u>Interested communities can find more information and apply by November 7th here.</u>

**AARP Vermont Accepting Grant Applications for Winter Placemaking Projects Promote Livability for All Ages** – AARP Vermont's 2022 Winter Placemaking Grants will provide financial support for six communities in the amount of \$4,000 per project to nonprofit or ad-hoc groups, whom meet the eligibility requirements, and are focused on reinventing or activating a public space during the winter months through programming or infrastructure improvements to enhance the safety, accessibility and overall appeal. **Vermont Biz: Vermont's new 'Replace Your Ride' funds cleaner transportation options** – Vermont has launched the first phase of a new incentive program to help residents with lower incomes replace older, high-polluting light-duty vehicles with clean transportation alternatives. Under the Replace Your Ride program, incentives of \$3,000 are available on a first-come, first-served basis to income-eligible Vermont residents who retire an operational high-polluting vehicle that is at least 10 years old and switch to a new or used plug-in electric vehicle (PEV). **Times Argus: 5-megawatt solar array in the works in Barre Town** – Thomas Hand, co-founder of MHG Solar out of Manchester Center, is working on a 5-megawatt solar array on property owned by Barry Stryker off Lowery Road. The fenced-in array would cover nearly 30 acres and would use nearly 10,300 solar panels. Once completed, the array would be connected to Green Mountain Power's electrical grid. VTDigger: Green Mountain Power expands battery storage to avoid buying energy from the grid – Green Mountain Power is working to install grid-scale energy storage facilities in Georgia, Springfield, Bethel, Middlebury, Bristol and Barre, almost doubling their storage capacity across the state. New large battery storage facilities will provide 25 megawatts of energy storage, adding to an existing 30 megawatts the utility already maintains throughout Vermont, Green Mountain Power announced this week.
