What is microtransit?

Microtransit is Uber with a van

Real-time, dynamically routed public transit service open to everyone

Different from taxi service

Handicapped accessible

Vermont's Microtransit Process

- 1. Concepts from each of Vermont's 7 transit providers were proposed to Vermont Agency of Transportation (VTrans)
- 2. VTrans awarded feasibility study funding to 12 proposed projects, split over two years
- 3. After the studies were complete, VTrans selected five initial projects to award pilot program funding
- 4. Pilots are funded for two years by 80% federal Congestion, Mitigation, and Air Quality (CMAQ) grants and 20% state transportation funds for FY23
- 5. The first round pilots are Barre, Middlebury, Manchester, Morrisville, and Windsor
- 6. After the second round of feasibility studies are complete, VTrans may award funding for additional pilot projects in FY24
- 7. Windsor will be the first FY23 pilot to begin operations in January 2023

What are the Benefits of Microtransit?

- fills gaps in existing fixed route services
- helps meet unmet needs
- serves populations not served by Medicaid, E&D, VA, others
- addresses spontaneous travel needs
- quality of life benefits
- allows groups like Volunteers in Action to use their resources elsewhere
- greater equity in transportation options

Target Ridership Markets


- seniors
- youth
- carless households and households with only one car
- people needing transportation to jobs
- temporary needs riders injury, car repair, temporary housing
- persons with disabilities

Pilot Program starting 1/23/23


Brattleboro Feasibility Study underway, should be complete by March 2023

Why was Windsor selected?

Windsor was chosen because:


- it had no existing public transit routes
- one vehicle should cover the project, making it less expensive
- strong advocacy by Mt. Ascutney Hospital
- seems like the right size town for microtransit

Project Funding

The project is funded by a CMAQ New Start grant

through VTrans.

\$120,000 federal funds
30,000 state funds
\$150,000 total



Project Organization

SEVT is responsible for administering the grant

The Core Team steers the project

The Stakeholder Group provides input for their clients

The Public provides key input

Two sets of public meetings

Community bulletin boards

Website

Social media

Surveys – riders, non-riders, businesses, social service agencies

Newspaper, radio, TV

Mailings

One on one meetings with key stakeholders

Strong Core Team leadership – varies by nature of the proposed service – Mt. Ascutney Hospital, Brattleboro Development Credit Corporation

Public Input Is Key



How will Microtransit work in Windsor?

• Monday-Friday non-holiday 6:00 am-6:00 pm

• Maximum 30 minutes wait time from request of ride to pick up

(more likely 15 minutes maximum)


• Curb to curb service or a short walk to meet the van

- Riders share a vehicle with other riders
- Fare free
- Within the Town of Windsor boundaries plus Exit 9
- One lift-equipped vehicle
- Trips must be reserved, and can be done by an app, calling the SEVT Office, or booking online.


No hailing of rides along the route.

What Riders Will See on the App



Brattleboro Project


Brattleboro has very high ridership 7:00 am-5:00 pm Monday-Saturday

Red Line – residential areas, hospital, high school, career center

White Line – employment, shopping, long-term hotels

Blue Line – Walmart, social services, park/ski hill/pool/skating rink, Amtrak

All three meet for transfers hourly at the Brattleboro Transportation Center



Brattleboro Unmet Needs

- Second and third shift employees
- Afghan refugees
- Students' after school programs – athletics, theatre, circus, other
- People getting home from 5 7:00 pm after the fixed routes close
- Dining, hospital discharges, cultural, municipal functions



Proposed Brattleboro Microtransit Scope

5:00-11:30 pm Monday-Friday

Within the Brattleboro Town limits (possibly Walmart until 6:00 pm)

One vehicle 7 seats w/o wheelchairs, 1 seat when two wheelchairs occupied

If funded, start September-October 2023 after public input process
